

Superintendent's Budget Message

The 2017-2018 school budget is designed to maintain educational initiatives and to efficiently staff our schools. This budget reflects our District's commitment to quality education for a diverse student population. As a result, the overall tax levy is **2.2 %** over last year. This increase translates to **\$1,340,000**. This amount is within the state imposed allowable tax levy cap.

As a result of the 2% cap, our school district strives to contain costs through numerous shared service agreements with other school districts and the Township of Ocean municipality. Such an agreement provides the Deal School with maintenance, cafeteria and technology services and the Long Branch School District with school bus mechanic services. These services are provided on a time and material basis by Ocean Township School District employees. The Board of Education continues to provide a former conference room in the administration building to the Ocean Township Chamber of Commerce for office space for approximately \$10,000 per year in rent. These are but a few of the many cost containment and alternative revenue generation strategies utilized by the school district.

To raise standards and expand educational opportunity for the children, the budget supports the continuations of full day kindergarten. Research indicates that funds invested in early childhood education lead to powerful returns. Studies reveal that children in full day kindergarten show greater gains in both reading and mathematics.

The budget includes technology, textbooks and supplies that support the implementation of the New Jersey Learning Standards and the Next Generation Science Standards. At Ocean Township High School, emphasis is being placed on Advanced Placement and dual enrollment courses and new electives. In 2017-2018, the new Spartan School of Business and Finance will begin at Ocean Township High School. This specialized program, partnered with Georgian Court University (GCU), will provide authentic learning opportunities for students and enable them to earn up to 18 college credits at GCU. Financially this program will be supported by a grant from the Department of Education in the amount of \$100,000 per year for 5 years.

This budget maintains the essential infrastructure of our computer network and additional educational technology. In 2017-2018, all students in grades 2-12 will have a personal Google Chromebook. Students in grades K-1 will have access to technology through classroom carts and computer labs. This project was a multiyear initiative that is the cornerstone of our educational technology plan.

The Township of Ocean School District has been recognized as a "high performing district" by the New Jersey Department of Education. I am very proud of our students and our teachers. Our elementary and intermediate school students continue to score above the state and peer school averages in most areas. Ocean Township High School offers 21 Advanced Placement courses. Last year 520 AP Exams were administered to 272 students. Ocean Township High School has been highly ranked by both *New Jersey Monthly* and *Newsweek* magazines, the *Washington Post* and the *Star Ledger*.

The 2017-2018 school budget strives to provide all of our children with a rich, challenging, equitable and developmentally appropriate education. While we are doing well, we still have many challenges to face to ensure that all children achieve to the best of their ability. The budget is both educationally sound and fiscally responsible.
